President's Message

The big news this month, as last month, is the upcoming Victoria Orchid Society show. The preparations and performance involves many workers and much planning. If you haven't signed up for some of the volunteer positions available during show days, there are still spots left.

This year a number of innovations have been introduced. Our usual Gala Evening is now to be called Preview and Awards Evening, which more clearly suggests its function. Admittance will be free; however, there will be an opportunity to donate to the conservation of orchids in the wild—definitely something we should be concerned with as a society. This is in line with the theme of the show which is *Orchids in Nature*.

One of the recipients being considered for donations is the AOS conservation fund which makes significant contributions to local awareness of endangered species and the preservation of sensitive sites. The orchid shown on our show posters, *Paphiopedilum helenae*, for example, is critically endangered with a very few disjunct populations in Vietnam and China. The number of mature individuals in the wild is thought to be no more than 50. The population decline is due to habitat destruction and collecting for horticultural purposes. The reduction over the last decade has been in the range of 85-90%.

February 26th meeting – Preparing Your Orchid for the Show with Ingrid Ostrander

Ingrid will explain how to prepare plants for display and Judging at Shows. She is a master at preparing plants for display. As a Senior AOS Judge, she has the experience as well as the eye. This is an important session for anyone who has even one plant to put in the VicOS display at the Show. Taking care of these plants well ahead of time allows staking to support blooms in a pleasing spray and trimming dead leaves and cleaning remaining ones, can make all the difference in how elegant the plant looks at the show. Don't miss this session.


Spring Show Update:

Nuggets of Science

Carnivorous Plants Going Vegetarian?

Certain carnivorous plants, known for trapping and killing tiny animals for food, may be turning vegetarian. Bladderwort, found in lakes and ponds worldwide, acquires vital nutrients from eating meaty prey, AND consuming algae and pollen grains. Researchers with the University of Vienna studied bladderworts (UTRICULARIA), one of the largest genera of carnivorous plants with over 200 species.

They investigated the contents of over 2,000 traps, and only 10% contained animals; 50% of the prey was algae. More than 33% of prey consisted of nearby tree pollen. Algae comprised even more of bladderworts' diet when plants lived in nutrient-poor habitats like peat bogs. Algae provide other nutrients, possibly phosphorus and trace elements. Algae and pollen as well as animal prey differ in nutrient value. Plants consuming both animals and algae were in the best shape; this broad diet provided a range of nutrients. Carnivorous bladderworts typically catch prey with sophisticated suction traps and valve-like trap doors that open and close in 3 milliseconds. Inside the trap, suffocated prey is digested by enzymes.

Orchids are much older than we thought.

A product of the Cretaceous.

This fungus gnat did not have a good day. First, she was duped into laying her eggs in an orchid instead of a mushroom, then she lost a leg, and finally she died, stuck in some tree sap. But between 45 and 55 million years later, her bad day is telling scientists that they need to reconsider the age of the orchid family. That tree sap preserved for the ages a pollen sac attached to the gnat's leg, and it is the earliest known evidence of the diverse family of flowering plants.

The round object under the fungus gnat's abdomen is an orchid pollinia.

Amber, fossilized tree sap, is really good at preserving things. In it, scientists have found ancient mammal blood inside a tick, a dinosaur feather, and plenty of insects and lizards. Orchid pollen sacs have been found in amber before, also attached to insects. But the previous oldest known specimen was found in Dominican amber that's 20 to 30 million years old. The new specimen, found in Baltic amber, is about twice as old.

"It wasn't until a few years ago that we even had evidence of ancient orchids because there wasn't anything preserved in the fossil record," said George Poinar Jr., an entomologist at Oregon State University who led the study, in a press release. The sticky pollen sac, known as a pollinia, is a common feature of modern orchids, which use a variety of evolutionary tricks to attract pollinators and get their pollen from one flower to another. But finding such an old example of a pollinia shows that the orchid family was pretty well-evolved when the gnat got stuck, back when palm trees grew in Alaska and India was just butting into Asia. That means the first orchids were probably blooming back during the Cretaceous, when dinosaurs were still at the top of the food chain.

Today there are around 28,000 species of orchid, and some of them are still up to their incredibly old ruses, fooling modern fungus gnats into picking up pollinia.

What's in bloom in the Orchid Collection

Oxystophyllum [Oxystophyllum.] atropurpureum

Thirsty six species make up this genus that originally stood as its own section in *Dendrobium* genus. The plants are characterized as a small, creeping, clumping or pendulous plants with very short, often thick stems carrying a few leaves that bloom on short, few flowered inflorescences carrying flowers with a distinctive colored lip apex and prominent wings or ribs on the ovary. The genus name is derived from oxy meaning pointed and phyllum meaning leaves.

This particular species, often referred to as the Dark Purple Dendrobium, is found in New Guinea near the coast.

It was first described by Karl Ludwig von Blume in 1849. The single flower per inflorescence is a thick, fleshy blossom with a dark claret or maroon pointed lip. Flowers are somewhat shortlived.

This plant was purchased by the OSPF from Ecuagenera in April 2017 and is kept in hot house on the sunnier side in high humidity.



Scaphosepalum [Sppm.] decorum

This another new genus to feature in this column. The genus has about 50 species that are found in mossy cloud forests from Guatemala to Peru up to elevations of 3000 meters. The genus name refers to the fused sepals that form a basin under the column.

The common name of this species is The Graceful Scaphosepalum and it is found in Cauca, southern Colombia, as a cool growing epiphyte at elevations around 1800 meters.

This plant was purchased by the OSPF from Equaflor-A in June of 2016 and is kept on the shade side of our intermediate house.

Pleurothallis [Pths.] canaligera

The *Pleurothallis* species can be found in Colombia, Ecuador and Peru at between 1200 to 2700 meters.

It is commonly referred to as the "Groove Carrying *Pleurothallis*" and it produces a cluster of tiny flowers (5 mm) at the base of the leaves.

The OSPF purchased this plant from Ecuagenera in April 2017 and it is grown on the shade side of our cold greenhouse.



Cymbidium [Cym.] Solana Beach

About 10% of the collection is hybrids and it was *Cymbidium* time in the greenhouse in early January. So I selected two examples, the first is *Cymbidium* Solana Beach. This is complex hybrid made from *Cymbidium* Rincon x *Cymbidium* Atlantes. In total, six *Cymbidium* species were used to produce this hybrid. It takes high light and is grown in bright, indirect light conditions on the sunnier side of our cold green house. This hybrid was first awarded by the Cymbidium Society of America back in 1977.

Cymbidium Fuss "Fantasy" which is another complex cross containing characteristics from eight Cymbidium species and needs similar conditions as Solana Beach. Both hybrids are often cultivated outdoors in the US. This hybrid was very popular in orchid shows in the late 1970's early 1980s, picking up 20 awards between the AOS and CSA where it was described as a "Novelty Cymbidium".
