# President's Message

The VicOS show is over for the year and was a great success. Many, many thanks to all the volunteers who contributed so much. A very special thanks to Melanie Norris who acted as show chair.

It is amazing how quickly March has crept up on us. After months of low light levels, the spring equinox is almost here, and suddenly, with equal days and nights, we are getting the same length of daylight as they get in the tropics (though I can't say it feels all that tropical out there, but it was  $15^{\circ}$ C today!). And this brings up the very important topic of greenhouse shading for those of us who have greenhouses. Mine, unfortunately, sits on top of a large rock, with sheer slopes all around. It has always been a real pain attaching shade clothes to the sides in the Spring and taking them down in the Fall. This has generally been accomplished by having one brave soul (not me) crawling across the top of the greenhouse roof. Not recommended. This year with the help of one of our knowledgeable society members (Thanks, Poul!), I am trying something new, namely applying shade paint. This was accomplished with a very long handle and a paint roller. For those who aren't familiar with this process, the paint is John Taylor

impervious to water (rain will not take off), but it can be fairly simply removed in the Fall with a release agent that acts on it chemically and allows it to be easily washed off.

The last few years the leaves of a number of my orchids have been looking rather yellow; I am thinking it's because the shade cloth only covers the sides of the greenhouse. It will be interesting to see how things go this year with the paint covering all of the outside.

The Vancouver Show is up next. I'm sure many of you have taken advantage of the vendors at this show to acquire new plants. Don't forget to send off your best specimens for the VicOS display. There will be AOS judging at the show, so any display plants can be considered for awards.

# **Upcoming Events:**



## **March: The Month of Work** - By Thomas Mirenda (This article was originally published in the March 2015 issue of <u>Orchids Magazine</u>)

*MOST OF US* spend a lot more time working at our jobs than at any other activity. While life balance may seem somewhat out of whack for the workaholics among us, fulfilling work and accomplishment makes us feel proud, productive and engaged. For many of us, work gives meaning to our lives. Yet I fear so many of us doubt what we do has any impact at all. While I am lucky enough to have a job I'm passionate about, many among us only work to generate money, and the satisfaction these people get from the work itself is pretty negligible, if it exists at all. Sometimes when working for a large company we tend to get lost in the corporate machinery and, like cogs in a wheel, lose cognizance of the relevance of our daily tasks. If we don't believe what we are doing is important or worthwhile, why should we bother to get good at it?

I think all us humans fall into this syndrome from time to time and March is a month where inspiration may be scarce indeed. Everyone reading this has a unique life-history and perspective, much like the orchids we cultivate. We all have purpose and direction as well as lovely and nurturing personalities. I've never met an orchid grower who didn't. Whatever your role in this workaday world may be, you are part of the fascinating, vibrant and passionate world of orchid growing. What better thing could we aspire to than to spread that joy and passion we know so well to others? I hope I see you out there at the next orchid show doing exactly that!

*BACK TO THE GRINDSTONE* March, with its lengthening of days and warming of temperatures, marks the beginning of the growing season for many of us. Many of our orchids, such as Phalaenopsis and Cymbidiums, have been blooming the last few months, but haven't done much vegetatively since

last fall and therefore haven't needed much in terms of water and fertilizer for quite a while. Now you should be seeing the beginnings of new growths, and most importantly, new green root tips. This is your signal that growth has resumed; repotting season has come and you need to be ready!

*SUPPLY CHAIN* It may seem a bit premature, but now is the time to stock up on the supplies you'll need for the onslaught of repotting necessary in the coming months. Your friends at the garden center will be so happy to see you and are likely to give you first-rate customer service because their business is still pretty slow until spring is in earnest next month. Get the jump on your orchid needs by purchasing fresh potting mix and a wide variety of containers in an array of useful sizes, both clay and plastic, as well as mounts and baskets, rhizome clips and stability stakes. Get enough so that you won't have to interrupt your rhythm and momentum during potting season to head back to the store for just a bit more.

*PRIDE IN YOUR WORK* If you haven't worked with your plants in a while, get out the books and review your potting techniques, and maybe invite a friend (or that curious teenager across the street) to help you. Sometimes showing someone else how to do something is the best reminder for protocols, such as how to strategize against spreading virus, potting securely and effectively and keeping an eye out for problems such as pests and pathogens that might have gone unnoticed in a crowded winter greenhouse. Reward your helpers with a nice healthy division of something pretty and vigorous that grows easily. This is to ensure they get the orchid bug too!

*FRUITS OF YOUR LABOR* The work you put into your collection this month as well as in April and May will invariably influence your success for the rest of the year. Plants that are neglected in the spring rarely perform well in the long term. While some plants will bloom a little better when slightly root-bound, waiting too long to repot will eventually lead to declining health and even death. Search your collection for plants that have grown past their pot rims (with obstreperous aerial roots) or don't dry out (due to rotting roots or broken-down mixes) or have weeds and ferns taking over, crowding out your precious orchids. There is nothing quite like a fresh potting job to fix a multitude of potential orchid problems. A little hard work now will repay you in boatloads of floral productivity this coming year!

Barb Davies reported that she had on behalf of the Society, sent a condolence card to Alexey Tretyakov and his family regarding the recent loss of his wife Mila, from cancer.

#### **Other Reports:**

AOS- John reported that the next judging will be at our Spring Show, Saturday, March 3<sup>rd</sup>. Members can bring plants for AOS judging only, if they wish. Kathryn explained that if you want plants judged at the VOS show in two weeks, she has cards available to fill out. Also she has cards to put with your plants, if you do not want them to be judged at our show.

*COC*-Sasha sent a report that he is in Vancouver and will be picking up the COC trophy from Calvin to bring back for our show this weekend.

*Library*- Ian reported that he has not had any feedback re: the missing books. John reported that he also has not had any response from the Hall contact people. He said that he will try again to ask for access to the locked classroom to check for the books.

Membership- Kathryn reported there are 70 members registered. She will have a membership card ready for new member, Lynne Johnson and she asked for a new membership list be sent out by Diana. Plant Orders- Sasha reported pre-orders for plants from Ecuagenera and Ching Hua need to be sent in very soon for pick-up at the VOS show on March 23<sup>rd</sup> weekend. Some members stated that they have not received confirmation on their pre-orders being received from Ecuagenera.

Plant Sales- Coreen has plants from Jonathan Littau for sale this evening.

Prize Draws- John reminded everyone to purchase their tickets during the break.

**Programs**- Rod reviewed the upcoming programs: March will be Rotating Stations, and the Annual Auction will be held in April. Rod is not sure if Alexey Tretyakov will be available to speak in May due to the recent loss of his wife to cancer. International speaker Alan Koch from "Gold Country" will be at the June meeting. Rod also announced that in October we hope to have another International speaker from China, Wenqing Perner and hopefully she will be bringing plants.

*Workshops-* Joe Chow reported that no further workshops are organized as Geoff Haywood has injured his back. *Website-* Diana reported that the names of the Sunday Show speakers will be added. Toni Dertlieva asked for more volunteers to speak, as she only has two people at this time.

*Spring Show*- Melanie updated everyone on the preparations for the show and asked members if they could bring as many of their blooming plants to fill our display table. It is not necessary for the plants to be there for judging. She spoke of visiting Phoebe Dunbar in Sooke, who is a wood artist and has offered to loan some of her wood pieces to us for use on the display table, as the theme of this year's show is "Orchids in Nature". Set up starts on Thursday and plant registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Friday. There are 79 people registered to attend the Friday night Preview and Awards Night and two door prizes have been donated. Jonathan Littau will have a vendor's table this year. Diana asked for more volunteers, especially for packers at the cashier's table. Barb asked for one or two more helpers to put out the show signs along the sides of the roads Saturday morning. Don Mills reminded everyone that he and his wife Marilyn, will be taking plants over to the VOS Spring show in two weeks. Please bring your plants to his house on March 22<sup>nd</sup>. Lioba has donated the use of her van again this year.

**Program:** John turned over the program to Ingrid and Poul who spoke on *Preparing Your Orchids for a Show*. Next Meeting: March 26, 2018 at the Gordon Head United Church Hall.

# **Society Information**

Meetings are held at the <u>Gordon Head United Church Hall, 4201 Tyndall Avenue</u>, Victoria, B.C. on the <u>fourth Monday of the month</u>. Members are encouraged to bring their orchids in bloom to display on the show table. They will be photographed and posted on our website.

Guest speakers are engaged for these meetings and often, speakers bring plants for sale. There is also a sale table where plants brought in by members may be purchased. There is often a pre-meeting, basic workshop from 6:45 - 7:30 p.m. Plant sales begin at 7:15 p.m. and the meeting runs from 7:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Membership fees are \$25.00 for individuals, \$35.00 for households. The Society membership year runs from September to September, but meetings are not held in July and August. Name tags are available for \$9.00, magnetized tags are \$11.00.

Coffee and tea are available for \$1.00 at the meeting and goodies are provided by members in rotation, based upon the initial letter of their last names. Goodies are requested from those with last names beginning with A, B, & C for the March meeting.
