# **Upcoming Events:**

The monthly meeting of the Victoria Orchid Society is held on the fourth Monday of every month except July, August and December, starting at 7:30 p.m. The plants on the display table are presented by experts, followed by a short business meeting, a coffee break with a prize draw of plants and orchid related material, and a featured presentation. The meeting ends at about 10:00 p.m. Often there is a premeeting workshop or Question & Answer session from 6:45-7:30 p.m.

Ingrid Ostrander will be giving the pre-meeting workshop for the May meeting on the topic of "What is an Orchid" It is such a large and varied group of plants that one cannot help but wonder how a little *Masdevallia* and a huge *Cattleya* can possess the same features. This session will be interesting even for experienced growers and fascinating for new growers.

# May 28th general meeting - Alexey Tretyakov will speak on Orchid Nutrition

Alexey has a diverse collection of orchid hybrids and species. Species and Dendrobium genus are dominant in his collection. As many amateur orchid growers, Alexey began his hobby from growing on windowsill and under lights. Today, his diverse collection (from warm to cool growing plants) is accommodated in a single greenhouse. A few years ago Alexey began to create new hybrids. His first hybrid was registered with Royal Horticultural Society (England) in 2013.

Alexey has lifelong interest in photography. Images of orchids, taken by Alexey, have been published in Orchid Societies Newsletters, AOS Bulletin and were posted at Orchids Forum.

This session on Orchid Nutrition is sure to provide some great tips on keeping your orchid collection flourishing. Alexey is known for growing orchids "outside the box", so there are sure to be some novel and valuable ideas.

# May-Native Species/Conservation Corner

I hope some of you were able to get out into the forests and find Calypso *bulbosa var. occidentalis* in the wild. The first week of May is peak flowering time. If you miss this window, higher up in the hills of our Island the snow is still melting and some Calypsos have not even started to spike yet. I have found some in bloom as late as July!

The rest of May belongs to the Coral Root Orchids. The genus name is *Corallorhiza*. This group of orchids don't have leaves and do not photosynthesize. They fall in the group of plants called Myco-heterotrophs. These plants parasitize the mycelium of the fungal network that lies under the soil of intact forests. Because these plants don't photosynthesize, they can grow in very shady parts of a forest. At the start of May, the new shoots come out of the ground like snake creatures.

The first species to bloom is *Corallorhiza striata*. I find these are always associated with Red Cedars growing in quite low light levels. They are the largest flowering and showiest of the Coral Roots.

The second species to bloom, *Corallorhiza maculata*, is our most common and wide spread Coral Root species. It is tolerant of many light levels ranging from total shade to dappled light. Mature plants can form very spectacular clumps when in bloom. There is also a rare pure yellow form.

The later species is *Corallorhiza mertensiana*. This is a very variable colored species with vivid pink purple flowers to almost white.

May is also a good time of year to notice the invasive species that plague many of our parks and wild spaces. A great website with loads of information and ways to get involved in your area is https://bcinvasives.ca I find the following four invasive species are the worst offenders of destroying native orchid habitat.



**Scotch Broom** is a member of the legume family and as a result actually changes the pH of the soil in which it grows. This alters the entire ecology of the area, killing off local species and encouraging more of the broom. This invasive is best cut right at ground level as any disturbing of the ground will just allow seeds to flourish. You do not want to disturb the ground with this one.


English Holly has a very aggressive root system, which out competes local plants for water. Once established, the waxy dark leaves form a dense bush that blocks out all sunlight, killing any native flora. The bright red berries are loved by birds and are easily dispersed throughout a forest quickly multiplying the problem. These can become small trees so it is much easier removing them while they are young.





**Daphne/Spurge Laurel** is not just destroying native plant habitat, its berries and sap are poisonous to people and pets. Birds are immune and they unfortunately spread the seeds. The sap is quite caustic so rubber gloves and eye protection are mandatory when handling this plant. In the forests this plant quickly out competes other plants by shading them out

with its lush dark foliage.





Learning about our native orchids is a great way to connect to our ecosystem and to become an advocate for its preservation
